# SPRINT RECORD BREAKER WHITNEY HEADS 2014 ALL USA GIRLS H.S. TRACK TEAM – AND AMERICA'S WORLD JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIP ENTRANTS

Say goodbye to Marion Jones, Allyson Felix, and Angela Williams -- who have dominated the high school record book for most of the last quarter century.

Say hello to Kaylin Whitney, just finishing her sophomore year at East Ridge (Clermont, Fla.). The 16-year-old has catapulted to the top of the high school sprint record lists and leads the 2014 American Family Insurance ALL—USA girls track and field team.

In June Whitney did not even have the best high school times this year. This month she became the fastest high school sprinter ever in America and the World Youth (under age 18) record holder at both 100 and 200 meters. On consecutive days at USA Track & Field's Junior Championships at Hayward Field in Eugene, Ore., Whitney ran 11.10 seconds for the 100 and 22.49 for the 200, both with legal aiding winds well under the allowable of 2.0 meters per second.

Whitney was surprised with her 200 meter performance on top of her 100 record. "I think more this one than the 100," she said, "because my PR before this one was just 22.8. Yeah, it was insane. Sky's the limit. You can only go up from here...and bringing it out in a few weeks when I come back....It really helps me get closer to that dream of being on the Olympic Team one day."

She will begin her international dreams next week (July 22-27), however, leading Team USA at the IAAF World Junior Championships on the same University of Oregon track

Previous 100 records were 11.11 (high school) by Williams of Chino, Calif., in 1998 and 11.13 (world youth) by Chandra Cheeseborough of Ribault (Jacksonville, Fla.), at the 1976 U.S. Olympic Trials (which also was the high school record until Williams broke it).

The 200 marks were 22.51 (high school) by Felix of Los Angeles Baptist (North Hills, Calif.) in 2003 and 22.58 (world youth) by Jones for Thousand Oaks, Calif. In 1992.

There is one faster 200 mark, 22.11, by Felix -- set at high altitude Mexico City in 2004. That time has not been internationally ratified due to the lack of drug testing in conjunction with that meet. (Although the 22.11 is the "listed" American Junior record, the IAAF recognizes the 22.18 by Felix as a 19-year-old post high school pro as the World Junior record. Whitney has a few more years to straighten that out.

Not since USATF Hall of Fame member Cheeseborough, nearly four decades ago, has one athlete headed both sprint lists. And Cheeseborough's 22.76 record at 200 meters in 1975 came with the advantage of Mexico City's mile-high altitude, running for Team USA at the Pan American Games. Her best marks were not set the same year, let alone at the same meet.

Jones was the previous fastest high school sophomore, running 11.17 and 22.76 for Rio Mesa (Oxnard, Calif.) in 1991, before transferring to Thousand Oaks – and then 11.14 and 22.58 for 16-year-old age records. The latter mark, at the 1992 U.S. Olympic Trials, remained the official world youth (under 18) record until this month.

Whitney catapulted ahead of regular season sprint leader **Ariana Washington** of Poly (Long Beach, Calif.), a three-time All-USA sprinter who had pacesetting marks in both the 100 (11.22) and 200 (22.96) after her repeat double wins at the California Interscholastic Federation state meet last month. She also anchored retiring Poly coach Don Norford's national leading 4 x 100 meter relay for a third gold medal. A double sprint medalist at last year's World Youth Championships, Washington was runner-up in Whitney's record race this month and will join her in a featured "World" race next week.

# RAVEN SAUNDERS (SHOT PUT) AND DESIREE FREIER (POLE VAULT) SET HS RECORDS – OUTDOORS & INDOORS

Two girls broke national high school records in field events this season.

Raven Saunders of Burke (Charleston, S.C.), smashed marks in the shot put outdoors (56 feet, 8 1/4 inches) and indoors (56-7 1/4). Current American record holder Michelle Carter had set the former records of 54-10 3/4 (outdoors) and 54-9 1/2 (indoors) in 2003 for Red Oak, Texas. Southern Illinois-bound Saunders wiped out a unique father-daughter high school record duo. Carter's father Michael Carter still owns the legendary boys shot put record of 81-3 1/2, set in 1979 for Jefferson (Dallas). Desiree Freier of Northwest (Justin, Texas) did the same in the pole vault, 14-3 1/4 outdoors and 14-6 indoors – raising the latter mark more than three inches.

#### NEW DISTANCE STARS TAKE OVER FOR PRO MARY CAIN

Three girls cracked the all-time distance ranks, even with star Mary Cain not eligible for consideration during her recent senior high school year at Bronxville, N.Y., while competing as a professional. **Bethan Knights**, Northwood (Irvine, Calif.) ran two miles in 9:53.54 to better the mark of 9:54.22 by Aisling Cuffe of Cornwall Central (New Windsor, N.Y.) in 2011. Knights, who is headed to the University of California (Berkeley) also led the season list at 3,000 meters.

**Alexa Efraimson**, Camas, Wash., set a high school record for the artificial 1,600 meter race (which is just short of the established mile distance), running 4:33.29. That topped Christine Babcock's 4:33.82 for Woodbridge (Irvine, Calif.) in 2008. Efraimson, a high school junior, was also leader this season at 800 and 1,500 meters, winning the USATF Junior title at the latter distance. Her 1,500 best of 4:07.05 ranks No. 2 all-time behind Cain's 4:04.62 last year.

**Elise Cranny**, Niwot, Colo., had moved into the No. 2 1,500 spot earlier in the season at 4:10.95 during a meet at her future college, Stanford, (which ranks as the fastest time by an eligible high school senior). She chased Efraimson to the finish at the Junior championships. Both made the USA team.

#### MORE ALL-USA SELECTEES SET FOR WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

All-USA selectees from every event group will be on the world TV stage next week for the international track federation's largest ever competition in the USA -- involving 1,546 teenage athletes from 175 countries.

In addition to the aforementioned athletes, ALL-USA selectees making Team USA for the world meet include:

**Dior Hall,** Washington (Denver) in the 100 meter hurdles, where she ranks as No. 2 all-time at 13.00. She won the silver medal at the 2013 World Youth Championships over the slightly lower 30-inch hurdles with a high school record 13.01 time. See is headed to Los Angeles to attend USC.

Two more reigning World Youth Championships silver medalists:

Stanford signee **Olivia Baker**, Columbia (Maplewood, N.J.), at 400 meters, and **Keturah Orji**, Mount Oliver (Flanders, N.J.), in the long jump. Both are the high school leaders in their events this season – with Orji, who is headed to Georgia, also pacing the triple jump.

**Raevyn Rogers** of The Kinkaid School (Houston) – who is headed to Oregon -- won the USATF Junior 800 meters to compliment her two World Youth medals (which includes a relay gold).

**Ky Westbrook** of Chandler, Ariz., the 2013 World Youth 100 meter champion, also made the World Junior team -- for the 4 x 100 meter relay -- along with **Teahna Daniels** of The First academy (Orlando).

--Ashlee Moore of Hamilton High School (Chandler, Ariz.) and Shaina Burns of South (Lakeville, Minn.) were the first U.S. athletes to qualify for the World Junior Championships, placing one-two in the women's heptathlon. Oregon signees Moore scored a personal best 5,418 points in the seven-event competition to move up to No. 5 on the all-time high school list. Burns, headed to Texas A & M, scored 5,363 – No. 8 all-time. Moore also placed third in the high jump at the USA Junior meet.

# McLAUGHLIN TOO YOUNG FOR WORLDS BUT NO. 2 ALL-TIME

Freshman **Sydney McLaughlin** of Union Catholic (Scotch Plains, N.J.) posted a World 14-year-old best in the 400 meter hurdles, 55.63 (also the second best ever by a high school student) to finish second to a college freshman, Shamier Little of Texas A&M (55.43), at the USA Junior championships. McLaughlin is a year too young, however, to compete in the World Junior meet. Another freshman, California Interscholastic Federation champion **Reonna Collier** from Piedmont Hills (San Jose), finished fourth in 58.55 – a record for a 15-year-old high school student. Both McLaughlin and Collier broke the freshman class prep record of 58.63 set by Kendell Williams of Kell (Marietta, Ga.) in 2010. Williams is doing OK as a University of Georgia freshman. She won the USA Junior 100 hurdles title in 12.87, an American Junior record (and No. 2 all-time world Junior).

--Vashti Cunningham, Bishop Gorman (Las Vegas) was the top high jumper this season at 6-3 to rank NO. 3 all-time, an inch off the high school record. Her inability to make it to the USA Junior Championships was significant – as the winning mark there was 5-10 1/2.

## 2013 ALL-USA STAR MARY CAIN ALSO ON THE WORLD ROSTER - AS A PRO

Although now a "pro" runner, 2013 ALL-USA team leader **Mary Cain** has just graduated from Bronxville, N.Y. and has also earned a spot on the World Junior team – in the 3,000 meters. She won that event at the USA Junior championships in 9:15.81, ahead of **Stephanie Jenks** of Lin-Marr (Marion, Iowa), who also made the World team.

Cain led the All-USA TODAY team a year ago as a high school junior, when she set prep records at 800, 1,500, and 5,000 meters.

A year ago, as a 16-year-old high school junior, she became the youngest American to make a USA (senior) national team and became the youngest athlete from any country to reach the finals of the 1,500 meters at an IAAF World Championship 1,500 meter race.
